As your local cooperative, delivering a strong patronage is important to the AgCarolina Board of Directors, association, and members. In 2024, The patronage refund for the Association was \$48.5 Million and average interest rate reduction of approximately 1.76%. We are eager to continue to deliver meaningful patronage dollars to members.

Your Association remains in extremely strong financial condition. In recent years, the merger allowed AgCarolina to diversify its loan portfolio and combine capital from two strong associations. Coupling the merger with an increase in earnings in recent years, patronage rates have increased. Going forward, we expect patronage in the future to moderate back down to more normal levels.

AgCarolina has been successful in profitably, growing our loan portfolio over the last three years. As the Association grows, a portion of our profits must be retained to sustain that growth. This investment helps to secure future income streams and prudently manage risk. The Board of Directors and management team remain committed to the mission of providing constructive credit and financial services that help our members to grow one local relationship at a time.

Thank you for trusting us to be your lender in both times of difficulty and bounty. We plan to continue to provide the service and dedication that you've come to trust. Together, we hope to overcome challenges and exhibit grit to achieve success. A bright future lies ahead.

AGCAROLINA FARM CREDIT REWARDED MEMBERS WITH 2024 PATRONAGE DISTRIBUTION

AgCarolina Farm Credit celebrated another successful patronage distribution to its members of their local lending cooperative. The all-cash patronage paid directly to members was \$48.5 million, providing members with an interest rate reduction of approximately 1.76%.

"Sharing our profits with members effectively lowers borrowing costs within our agriculture and rural lending cooperative. For 2024, our patronage refund translated to an average interest rate reduction of 1.76% for members," states Evan Kleinhans, CEO of AgCarolina Farm Credit. "This clearly demonstrates the unique financial advantages of partnering with a local cooperative."

Kleinhans continues, "We deeply appreciate our members for choosing us as their local lending partner. Your trust and support enable us to continue providing valuable financial benefits, such as delivering strong patronage refunds."

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"AgCarolina is easy to work with", states Judd Hyde, an AgCarolina Farm Credit member from Spring Hope, NC. Hyde continues, "We are thankful for the simple loan process and knowledgeable AgCarolina team. Alongside the all-cash patronage distribution, AgCarolina branches hosted celebrations on Patronage distribution day, March 25th 2025. Members who attended the branch celebrations were entered to win the grand prize, a Kubota RTV520. AgCarolina partnered with Louisburg Tractor to give this year's recipients, Judd and Kimberly Hyde, the RTV.

MENTAL HEALTH

48 percent of rural residents and farmers say they are personally experiencing more mental health challenges than they were a year ago.

Locally, the NC Agromedicine Institute focuses on creating a safer and healthier life for farmers, fishermen, foresters, their workers and their families through research, prevention/intervention, and education/outreach. Some of their focus areas are stress management and mental health. The Institute is a partnership between East Carolina University, North Carolina State University, and North Carolina Agricultural and Technical State University. They work with those in the agricultural community, businesses, health care organizations, and other organizations to identify risks for farmers.

At a national level, Rural Resilience is a free, private, online training course to help farmers and their families cope with the rising stress they face.



HOW TWO GRANT RECIPIENTS ARE GROWING THEIR COMMUNITIES

FUELING THE NEXT GENERATION

Terra Ceia Christian School, located in Pantego, NC, is the home of a growing FFA chapter. Focusing on educating the future generation of agricultural leaders, the FFA chapter has seen an increase in students interested in their livestock program. With the increase in participation, the more students they have traveling and learning how to raise and show livestock. The chapter requested the grant in order to purchase a truck transport box, also known as a "popper" in the livestock world. This allows the students to safely transport livestock to various livestock show competitions in and out of state. Our grant also allotted the funds for them to add a pen to keep the animals in.





GRANTING SAFETY: INVESTING IN RURAL RESPONSE

The Snow Hill Rural Fire Department, located in Greene County, was a 2024 grant recipient. Their grant request focused on the quality of rural life as they sought out this grant to purchase rescue equipment. Located in a large farming community, the department needed to expand their off-road emergency response. The equipment purchased with the grant allows them to be able to safely transport injured citizens from field to road.







SWEET REWARDS FOR LEE'S BEES ABOUND WITH FAITH AND PASSION

Dr. Jeffrey Lee has had a passion for bees from an early age. He had his first hive at age 13 and never lost the delight in being a "bee shepherd" as he calls it.

Dr. Lee now owns Lee's Bees, a thriving pollination rental and honey business in Mebane, NC and Jamesville, NC. Although his passion never waned throughout the years, his journey to his current occupation has not been without struggles. Certainly, though, the rewards have been sweet.

Dr. Lee went to college for chemistry and biology at Pepperdine and Duke. After college, he started working in the North Carolina pharmaceuticals industry. After a few years, he realized he would always have a boss if he stayed in his line of work. And so, he bet everything on bees, selling everything he had and maxing out every credit card. He took out a home equity loan and bought bees.

The process to purchase land to house the bees and build a workshop began. AgCarolina was the only lender that would consider lending Dr. Lee the money for his venture.

"I've always been appreciative of that [the loan for Lee's Bees] because when I was very young in the business, they were willing to loan me the money," said Dr. Lee.

Dr. Lee was specifically interested in locations where he could make Tupelo honey. Tupelo honey is known for its rarity and flavor. It comes from the blossoms of the tupelo tree (Nyssa aquatica). The flavor is fruity, with a bit of citrus floral. Jamesville was an area where Dr. Lee could produce the sought-after Tupelo honey. The bees make the special honey in April near the Tupelo swamp.





Today, Lee's Bees has 2,000-3000 colonies (~8.5 million bees) that are moved throughout the year to various locations across the country to find flowers for the bees to eat. Some bees are rented out to farmers to pollinate crops like almonds in California, blueberries in Maine, cranberries in Wisconsin, and watermelons and squash in NC. Some bees continue to travel around the state, producing honeys such as Sourwood, Gallberry, Wild Flower, Clary, Sage, and the Water Tupelo.

"It's a leap of faith whenever you go into a business on your own, and you're relying on an insect to pay all of your bills," said Dr. Lee.

After betting it all on bees, his passion and faith have carried him to some sweet rewards.

"I believe God has groomed me for this position," Dr. Lee said. "I have faith that as long as I try to bring glory to God, everything will work out."
