AGCAROLINA FARM CREDIT DISTRIBUTED THEIR 2023 PATRONAGE TO MEMBERS

AgCarolina Farm Credit returned and celebrated a patronage distribution of \$49 million.

AgCarolina Farm Credit recently celebrated another strong patronage distribution disbursed directly to its members. The all-cash 2023 patronage distributed \$49 million, returning approximately 30% of interest accrued by members in 2023.

"As your local lending cooperative, the memberelected board is passionate about delivering a strong patronage as it reflects the strength and health of the Association. The opportunity to put our profits back in the pockets of our membership in the form of patronage returns, is a valuable benefit of being a part of your local lending cooperative" said CEO of AgCarolina Farm Credit, Evan Kleinhans.

"By distributing our profits to our members, it reduces the effective cost of borrowing in our agriculture and rural lending cooperative. Our 2023 patronage refund equates to an average interest rate reduction of 1.75% for members and it further proves the distinct financial benefits of doing business with a local lending cooperative."

In addition, AgCarolina Farm Credit partnered with Barnes Equipment to give away a Kubota RTV520 as part of this year's patronage celebration. Members that participated in local branch celebrations were entered into a drawing to win. Al and Vanessa Murray, members of AgCarolina Farm Credit, were announced the winners.

PHISHING PROTECTION

Unfortunately, we must stay vigilant against those that would scam us through phishing attacks. Phishing is a fraudulent email or other message sent purporting to be from a reputable company with intentions of getting you to reveal personal information such as passwords or credit card numbers.

Although many spam emails and messages get filtered out, some slip through. They often use familiar brands, official logos, and believable stories to trick you. Some stories they might tell:

- Unexpected or suspicious invoice for you to click on.
- Say there's an issue with your account.
- Claim your payment information has an issue.
- Say you're eligible for a government refund.

Other red flags to look out for:

- Generic greetings like "Hello Dear," or "Hi, Sir/ Ma'am".
- A link to update your payment or account information. Legitimate companies may communicate via email or text, but they won't send a link to update your information.
- Email address is off. Often scammers change the email address by a single letter or character. For

example, they may change janedoe@company. com to jane_doe1@company.com or jane.s.doe@ company.com.com. Only one character changed, but that one character could have disastrous results.

- Odd misspellings in the message could also be a tell that it is a scam.
- You don't have an account with the company messaging you.

If you suspect a phishing message, be sure to report and delete the message. Reporting can help fight these scammers. Emails should be forwarded to the Anti-Phishing Working Group at reportphishing@apwg.org. Texts should be forwarded to SPAM (7726). You can also report phishing to the FTC (Federal Trade Commission) at https://reportfraud.ftc.gov/.

Additional ways to protect yourself from phishing are to be proactive. Use security software and set it to update automatically. You can also protect your cell phone by setting software to update automatically. Two other prudent practices are to back up data on your devices and use multi-factor authentication.

When in doubt, don't click on any links. Be smart about what you click and take precautions to protect yourself against phishing.

WOMEN IN AG-LIVE LEGENDARY

Ladies gathered for a day of fun, camaraderie, and inspiring conversations for the 5th annual Women in Ag Conference in March. Held at the Lone Oak Parkton in Parkton, NC, the day was a chance for AgCarolina to bring together women in the ag industry to recharge, learn, and laugh.



This year's conference had two guest speakers—Kiah Twisselman Burchett (Coach Kiah) and Courtenay DeHoff. Kiah was a California cattle rancher who is now an international motivational speaker. Her mission is to empower people to love and care for themselves more. During the Women in Ag Conference, Kiah spoke to attendees about "Growing Through It" where she focused on growing the good thoughts and to stop watering the weeds. In her presentation, she shared that humans have about 60-70,000 thoughts per day; 90% of those thoughts are repetitive. How much energy is being put into repetitive, negative thoughts?

She also reminded us that often women may hide experiences or struggles in shame. Kiah led a moving "Standing up for your Sister" workshop that reminded attendees that we never know what someone is going through and we must



unite together to support. During Courtenay's speech, there was a focus on "Living Legendary". Courtenay is a Kansas cowgirl turned motivational speaker. Her goal is to build a "supportive community of unstoppable women who fearlessly chase their dreams and leave a lasting impact on the world." Her hashtag #FancyLadyCowgirl started a movement to be unapologetically oneself and celebrate women. She shared that 900 million people feel unfulfilled in their daily lives (Forbes), and she was one of those. Not until Courtenay decided to live boldly and legendary did she find herself. She encouraged women to "make your mess, your message".

The speakers were dynamic and left attendees inspired and reenergized. In addition to taking home encouraging words, the Women in Ag attendees took home local honey, fresh flowers, goat soap, and popular Women in Ag socks!

Around 32.5% of North Carolina farmers are female. Putting on an event, especially for them, is always a highlight for us at AgCarolina Farm Credit. Being able to bring women in the agricultural industry together is so special.

AgCarolina looks forward to hosting the next Women in Ag conference in March 2025.

AGCAROLINA PARTNERS WITH LUMBEE TRIBE TO OFFER AGBIZ EDUCATIONAL COURSES

The AgBiz program is one that we at AgCarolina believe in. It is an investment in up-and-coming farmers and the future of agriculture. AgBiz is an educational opportunity for individuals to learn better business practices in their agricultural operation and be able to be mentored by Association employees.

AgCarolina Farm Credit partnered with the Lumbee Tribe to offer these courses. LeAnn Melivin and her husband not only wanted to ensure the success and sustainability of their farm Magnolia Rose, but wanted to incorporate their Lumbee Tribe heritage into their farm goals. The AgBiz course helped them achieve these aspirations.

"As a proud member of the Lumbee Tribe of North Carolina, my family and I are deeply committed to revitalizing indigenous agricultural practices," said Melvin. "The course equipped me with the tools to effectively merge these traditional practices with modern business strategies, allowing us to preserve our cultural heritage while staying competitive in today's market. This balance is essential for honoring our ancestors and fostering a thriving, sustainable future for our community." Another participant, Brian Jacobs, operator of Sapling & Flint Farms, had goals of enhancing financial literacy, expanding knowledge on sustainable practices, and improving business planning skills.

"Going into farming is a significant and uncharted step for me. I am looking for ways to provide much-needed products and services to my community while making enough profit to care for my family," shared Jacobs.

The courses are designed for young, beginning, and small farmers (YBS) and covers topics in financial management, farm business management, lending, business planning, industry trends, profits, and professionalism. With two opportunities - AgBiz Basics and AgBiz Planner—the courses provide lessons for those that are just starting out (or haven't even started) and those more established.

Jacobs was particularly struck by a section covering the impact of ethical practices on business success. "The discussions around the Pyramid of Leadership and the importance of ethics in business operations were particularly enlightening. Understanding how ethical behavior and a strong value system can influence not only a business's internal culture but also its reputation and success in the market was a significant takeaway," said Jacobs.

For the Melvins, taking the AgBiz course doesn't only benefit their farm, but it also has a positive impact on their community. They hope to promote the cultivation of traditional foods indigenous to the area to pass on to future generations.



"We will host workshops and community events that focus on traditional preserving, cooking, and eating practices, demonstrating the importance of these methods in maintaining our cultural heritage. By integrating the modern business strategies learned in the course with our ancestral knowledge, we aim to create a sustainable model that benefits our community both economically and culturally," shared Meluin.

It is important that YBS farmers are given the knowledge and opportunities to succeed in their endeavors and the AgBiz program offers tools to help farmers thrive. It is exciting to see their dreams, efforts, and passion on the farm.

LANCASTER FARMS: ROOTED IN HERITAGE, GROWING FOR TOMORROW



Since the late 1700's, the Lancaster family has lived and farmed in Wilson County, North Carolina. The Lancaster family understands the value of producing quality food and fiber for the world, while remembering the core values that were set by the many generations before them.

The Lancasters, like all farm families, understand the importance of their role in helping feed the world. While earlier generations of the family began their farming careers by producing tobacco, cotton and grains, the present generations have taken their knowledge and innovation and expanded the family farm by adding peanuts, sweetpotatoes, and produce.

The seventh generation of the Lancaster family includes the Lancaster cousins-Sarah Carraway, Vann Lancaster, Derek Lancaster, and Bryant Lancaster. As the youngest working generation of the family, each of the cousins has an equal understanding of how important using innovative farming techniques, keeping up with technology, and remembering family values can impact the future of the farm.

Acknowledging their strengths, each of the cousins have stepped into leadership roles within different areas of the farm. Sarah serves as the office manager as she oversees the books, payroll, the H2A program and food safety. Recently, Sarah's sister Julia has joined the family farm to assist Sarah in her daily responsibilities. Bryant manages tobacco production and is known as the "technology guru" as he spends a lot of his time troubleshooting and keeping up with the latest technology. Vann manages the peanuts as well as being the go-to for general farm management. Together, Vann and Bryant

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manage the cotton. Derek manages the tobacco during the greenhouse and curing stages while also managing all sweetpotato production from seed to harvest. Recently, the cousins joined together and added a new venture to the farm by building turkey houses.

In addition to their roles operating the family farm, each of them serve the local agriculture community on various boards such as the NC Sweetpotato Commission, NC Farm Bureau, Wilson County Cooperative Extension Advisory Council, Wilson County Young Farmers Association, and Wilson County Tobacco Advisory Committee.

Their hard work and dedication to the agricultural community was why Norman Harrell, Wilson County Cooperative Extension Director, nominated them for the Innovative Young Farmer of the Year award. This award is presented by the Farm Credit Associations of North Carolina at the NC Tobacco Farm Life Museum, Breakfast with the Commissioner.



"I believe these four young farmers are truly deserving to be recognized as the Innovative Young Farmer of the Year. They are hardworking and all play critical roles in the operation of Lancaster Farms. They are well on the way in preparing the farm for the eighth generation to return to the farm," added Harrell.

The Lancaster's have been members of AgCarolina Farm Credit for over twenty years. When discussing why they enjoy being members of the cooperative, Sarah said, "It's not always about the business, sometimes it's more about the relationships and people".

While AgCarolina is financially competitive with interest rates, having a loan officer who understands, supports, and cares about our operation is why we borrow from AgCarolina", Sarah added.

Bryant added, "The relationships, the patronage, and you're dealing with good people, so why not them?" As the family continues to grow and build on what generations before them started, they will always honor their roots and those who have helped them along the way, and that includes AgCarolina Farm Credit.

Recipe Sweet Corn off the Cob

We've never met someone who didn't like sweet corn. Sweet corn is a summer staple here in North Carolina. While its homegrown goodness is great just on the cob, it also offers a foundation for creativity. Here's a recipe that by no means should be followed exactly. Think of it as a guideline. Just cook with your heart.

Ingredients

- 2 4 fresh sweet corn ears, husks removed
- 3-4 tablespoons butter or olive oil
- Salt and pepper to taste
- 3 cloves garlic, minced
- Herb like basil
- Onion, either green (sliced) or shallot (finely diced)

Instructions

- 1. Cut the corn off the cob.
- 2. Heat either butter or oil in a skillet.
- 3. Sauté corn, garlic, and onion of choice together until tender (5-6 minutes).
- 4. Season with salt and pepper and toss in your herb of choice. We love basil!
- 5. Serve warm or chilled.

Variations

- Use cilantro as your herb and add diced jalapeño with a squeeze of lime juice for a different flavor.
- Add other vegetables from the garden to cooled corn for a fresh salad. We love tomatoes and cucumbers!
- Throw in some cheese to cooled corn. Goat cheese, feta, or cotija are great options.
- Grill your corn on the cob before cutting it off. This will give it a different flavor profile.

SWEET CORN FACT 99% of corn grown in NC

is field corn. Only 1% is sweet corn.
